ANS Annual Meeting June 15-17, 1959

Hot Laboratory Division

A Hot Laboratory Division, first professional Division within the American Nuclear Society, was petitioned by the Board of Directors at its meeting in Detroit, December 10, 1958. Fifty-eight ANS members including all the members of the Hot Laboratory Committee signed the original petition and are registered as charter members of this Division. The Hot Laboratory Committee is older than the ANS. Its first two meetings were classified. The last four meetings of the group were unclassified and were held in conjunction with the Nuclear Congress.

It is the intention of this Division to concern itself with the application of disciplines and technologies composing nuclear science and engineering to the following: design, construction, operation, and management of hot laboratories and of specialized equipment, facilities, and techniques required for and peculiar to the control of contamination and radiation as it arises in the use or the handling of radioactive material or the machines by which radioactive material is generated.
